

Police disarm letter bomb at Greek embassy in Paris

Embassy staff called the police when the letter from Italy, addressed to the ambassador with no return address, emitted smoke from a basement storage room.

The police detected wires and a battery inside the enveloped and doused it with water preventing an explosion.

Letter bomb sent to Deutsche Bank

German police investigating a suspicious item sent to Deutsche Bank's Frankfurt headquarters say initial findings show it was an "operational letter bomb".

The item was addressed to the bank's chief executive, Josef Ackermann. A letter from an Italian anarchist group has been found threatening three bomb attacks, police say.



Chief executive Josef Ackermann was the intended recipient of the item

Staff at the bank intercepted the letter on Wednesday and alerted police after X-raying it. "Local police, working with specialists, defused the explosive," Hesse state police said.

Italian letter bomb injures top tax collector

A letter bomb injured a top Italian tax collector in the hand when it exploded at the headquarters of Equitalia, a state agency that collects overdue taxes and fines, police said on Friday.

Bomb scare empties Government Offices

Parts of Sweden's government offices at Rosenbad in Stockholm were evacuated following the discovery of two suspicious packages, one of which was reportedly a gift from Uruguay's visiting president.



The package had "wires and batteries". A similar parcel had been delivered to the nearby foreign ministry.

Parcel bomb sent to Justice Minister

Athens, February 2011

Greek police destroyed a parcel bomb addressed to the Justice Minister, Haris Kastanidis, the day before the resumption of a trial of 13 alleged members of an anarchist group behind attacks on politicians' homes and offices.

The parcel contained "a small quantity of explosives", a Police spokesman said. The package was delivered by courier, with the sender named as the "Independent Lawyers Initiative".

Two Embassies Hit by Parcel Bombs

Bombs hidden in packages exploded at the Swiss and Chilean embassies in Rome on Thursday, wounding two people.

The package at the Swiss Embassy went off as soon as it was opened by a staff member, who was hospitalized with injuries to both hands.

Hours later, an employee at Chile's embassy was wounded by an exploding parcel.
